Although not as significant, in 2012, St. Mark (Yorkton) celebrated 25 years since its founding. St. Andrew (Canora) is enjoying their more permanent home now that the renovations are almost complete. Please pray for Theotokos of the Life-Giving Spring Mission (Winnipeg) as they seek God's direction and blessing in finding a permanent home for them to gather and worship together.

As I look forward for the next three years, I see the theme of stability as the wind of change dies down, and we labour together in the vineyard given to us to tend by God.
